Imagine if we would be able use our space today — a Covid-19 Free Zone — how would our new library be used during such a crisis? We suspect we would have standing-room-only lectures and telecasts in the auditorium on the medical implications of Covid-19 and how the Jennersville and Chester County Hospitals are prepared to meet community needs. 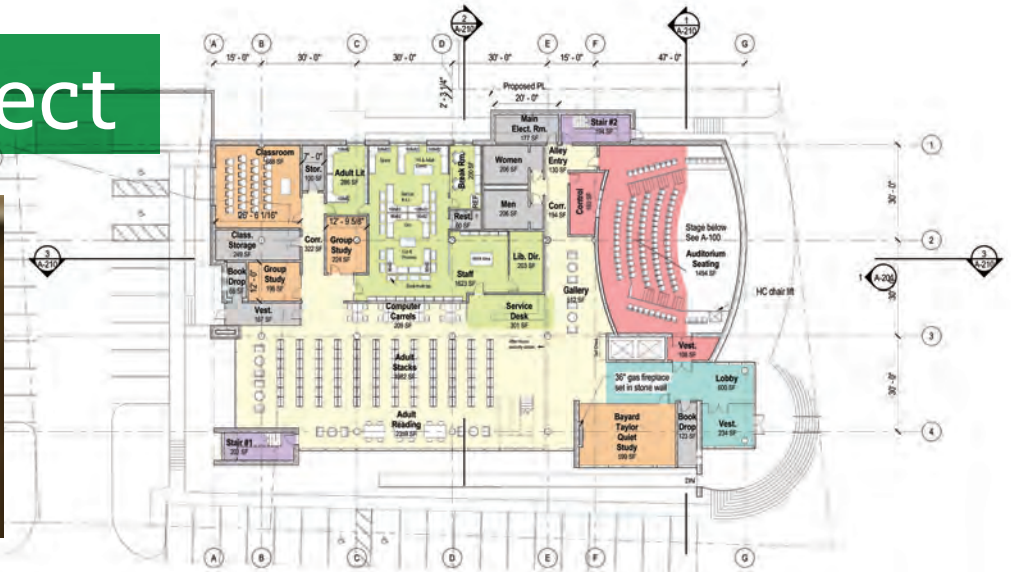

ary Hutchins, Campaign Associate, came to the Library from Historic Kennett Square. Prior to that she was a reporter and then editor of *The Kennett Paper*, so we asked her to interview our architect, Greg Lukmire with Lukmire Associates.

**Mary:** *Tell us a little about yourself.*

**Greg:** I have a bachelor's in architecture from University of Virginia and a master's from Harvard University. In my youth, I worked in Boston for Perry Dean & Stewart, did an internship in Oxford, England and landed in Washington DC as an Associate for Cooper Lecky Partnership. I now work out of Alexandria, VA and purchased the firm which became The Lukmire Partnership in 1989.

**Mary:** *How many libraries have you designed?*

**Greg:** The first library I helped design was in 1980 — Reston Regional Library in Fairfax, VA. Since that time, Lukmire has programed and designed or consulted on about 50 public libraries in the mid-Atlantic region. These libraries have ranged in size from 4,500 square feet to 90,000 square feet. Recently, we added an addition of 150,000 square feet to the George Mason University library.

**Mary:** *What is your number one priority when designing a library?*

**Greg:** It is to create a vibrant community resource that is:

- Multigenerational
- Multicultural
- Center for information
- Flexible to adapt to the needs of the community
- Life-long learning center
- Place of comfort and safety
- Reflection of community values

**Mary:** *What was the overarching concept your team had in mind when designing the Kennett Library?*

**Greg:** That's a tough one because there were public meetings, programmatic and aesthetic issues, urban planning, and financial considerations that went into the design. So, the overarching concepts were to insert a new, exciting, public amenity into downtown Kennett Square, one that will inject new activity, and work in synergy with retail businesses to reinforce Kennett as a destination for residents in the regional service area. The library should serve as both a cultural and economic stimulus to Kennett Square and its surroundings.

**Mary:** *What is most exciting to you personally about this project?*

**Greg:** We at Lukmire are excited about the design because it will be such an impressive milestone for

the community as it recovers from Covid-19. It's beautiful and will be a tremendous boon to Kennett Square for generations to come!

**Mary:** *How do you see libraries changing over the next five years?*

**Greg:** Libraries have evolved and will continue to evolve as the way we receive information evolves. Obviously, the printed word will still be there, and people will continue to read books. However, in addition, libraries are changing to become:

- THE center of public information
  - Places of collaborative learning and interaction
  - A quasi social services center
- People searching for employment
- Educational and information resource for immigrant communities
- Life-long learning centers
- Community meeting places with sophisticated audio/visual capabilities
- More open, flexible spaces to enable them to adapt to changes in community needs
- "Safe place" of choice for a wide range of citizens

**Mary:** *Anything else you would like to add?*

**Greg:** Architecture matters and you're really going to like having this building in your community.

In February 2017, I started volunteering at the Kennett Library. I soon learned that shelving is a huge help to the staff because it frees them to assist patrons. Sign me up! Ever since, I have been coming in for an hour every week to tackle packed book carts of returned materials. It's a wonderfully tangible task that makes me feel accomplished and calm. Oh, and it helps the staff! Win-win!

Before I started volunteering, I probably only spent about two minutes per library visit. I put my books on hold online, and then I breezed in and out when I picked them up. It was very convenient, but I never really saw what the library was doing. However, once a week, I had the chance to eavesdrop — I mean, see what goes on at the library. Here's a sampling of what I heard:

- Thoughtful engagement with students of all ages, like science experiments, discussions about graphic novels, and Maker Space projects
- So much learning going on! One-on-one tutoring and ESL classes
- Welcoming groups for anyone who wanted to join, including book clubs, a writing group, poetry club, and board game night

Today's library is much more than books, and I don't just mean technology. Libraries are true gathering places with no barrier to entry. The incredible library staff embodies this philosophy with consistency, creativity, and compassion. They build connections and promote literacy with everyone who steps through the door. The more time I spent in the library, the more I realized its important value in our town, and I was happy to shelve books to enable that work.

During my volunteer hours, I saw the impressive work of the library, as well as the challenging constraints. Running out of tables and space due to demand might be "a good problem to have," but it's still a problem. The Kennett Library serves thousands of patrons in our area, and in order to do so with excellence, we need more space and resources! As a patron, volunteer, and now Trustee, I am so excited to dream alongside the staff about what the new library building can be in our community. When we aspire to cultivate Kennett Square as a place where people can grow, learn, and connect, the library enables all of those good things.

I can't wait to see what's next for the Kennett Library and Kennett Square!

## The Kennett Library in 2019...



- The Kennett Library Adult Literacy Program helped 761 clients through tutoring, ESL classes and office visits. Library tutors helped 15 students earn American citizenship. Also, the program celebrated its 40th Anniversary in 2019!
